#### 2- Background of the Assessment:

According to Pakistan's National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA), as of 3<sup>rd</sup> September the severe adverse weather has resulted in the Total Population Damage 33,046,329 in 80 districts of Punjab, Sindh, Baluchistan, GB, KP, AJ&K, deaths of at least 1290 people, including 570 males, 259 female and 453 children, while 12588 people were injured, including 5267 males, 3355 female and 3966 children, Total houses damage are 1468019 including 923643 partially damage while 544376 are fully damage. In addition, 736,459 livestock are died or drowned whereas 5563 Km roads, 243 bridges and 173 shops also damaged. http://cms.ndma.gov.pk/storage/app/public/situation-reports/September2022/lvA8FuHC9C1pun 4DEZOa.pdf

Increased casualty rate, economic losses, and damage to infrastructure and livelihood causing a huge impact on vulnerable populations calls for an immediate yet coordinated humanitarian relief and response because heavy rains, hill torrents, flashflooding and Breaches to MNV (Main Nara Valley) drain did the most damage this year, leaving behind a trail of tragedy of homelessness and material losses like livestock, crops, valuables kept safe in homes.

#### 4- Government Immediate Action Taken:

According to the PDMA (Sindh )/ (SITREP)/2022/955 Daily Rain-Flood Report dated 03<sup>rd</sup> Sep 2022, PDMA & NDMA Punjab provided 131.988 tents, 14 hospital tents, 573,845 mosquito nets, 50,882 ration bags, 1,950 plastic mat/Chatai, 90,810 plastic tarpaulin, 7,556 animal mosquito nets, 17,330 jerry canes, 88 dewatering pumps (TM), 76 dewatering pumps (GS), 174 dewatering pumps small, 16,019kitchen sets, 50 boats with OBM, 190 life jackets, 158 water coolers, 4,293 folding beds, 4,720pillows, 4,620 bed sheets, 3,810 wooden pellet, 1,350 stoves, 1,000 hygiene kits, 1,514 school shelter, 18 chemical spray machines and 15 portable wash rooms to the flood population in Sindh province. In addition to the aforementioned relief, FGRE (INGO) provided cooked food (1058 Daigs) to the flood affected people. Out of 131.988 tents, PDMA/NDMA provided 600 tents in Jacobabad, 960 tents and 500 tarpaulin sheets in Jamshoro district.

- 1. To assess the extent and magnitude of damage caused by floods and heavy rains
- 2. Identify any immediate emergency interventions required for the affected communities in Sindh (Ghotki, Dadu, Jamshoro & Jacobabad)

### 7- Rapid Need Assessment by the REEDS Team:

District Ghotki, Dadu and Jamshoro are the project areas of REEDS from Last many years with proper structure and having more than 256 regular male and female field staff members along with 48700 cotton farmers., while Jacobabad we have a consortium partner Keeping in view the situation REEDS local team along with the Relief and Rehabilitation Program team conducted a Rapid Need Assessment as per the described format. Rahim Yar Khan district is also area where REEDS also implementing project with the financial support of KNH-Germany.

#### 8- Assessment Methodology:

- 1- This assessment primarily targeted the most affected areas in three affected districts of Sindh including Dadu, Jamshoro, Ghotki and Jacobabad
- 2- Data collection from all the district administration focal persons i.e District Disaster Management Coordinator, Flood Control Room, News Paper etc.
- 3- RNA Tool development
- 4- Orientation of the staff/volunteers regarding the tool
- 5- Physical meeting and field visit with the rain/flood affectees and the stakeholders where possible
- 6- Secondary data as per SITREP/situation report released on daily basis by the district government and National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA)

## 9- Rapid Assessment During emergencies Limitations:

Due to time constraint and difficulty in access to all areas, selection of respondents and ensuring inclusion, communication to majority of most affected and vulnerable population is compromised. Therefore, the assessment may not be able to produce comprehensive information. Information from various sources and from different assessments may not be comparable although the information collected through REEDS staff available in the districts of regular projects.

#### 10- Criteria for the selection of RNA Area:

- 1-The calamity hit area/districts declared by the Provisional Disaster Management Authority 2-District Administration request for the support of flood affectees
- 3-Higly affected Tehsils and Union Councils with the consultation of District Administration
- 4-REEDS have direct presence in the district/Tehsils and have close coordination with the local communities

## 12- Key Findings and Recommendations:

Floods have affected all the basic services that existed in the IDP settlements. This includes WASH, Education, livelihoods, Agriculture & Livestock, Health and Nutrition. In WASH, infrastructures such as water kiosks, communal latrines, HHs latrines have been demolished and filled with water leaving affected HHs to practice open defecation. Mobile health team cannot access some of the IDPs settlements due to flood. Since the transport pathways are stopped from the settlement to the main town, IDPs HH cannot access their livelihood strategies.

As per the notification No. R/F-272/2022 dated 21-08-2022 of Government of Sindh Additional Relief Commissioner, on account of heavy rains during monsoon 2022 declared 23 districts of Sindh "Calamity Affected Area" under the provision of the Sindh National Calamities (Prevention & Relief) Act 1958.

## 12.1-Details of House Damage:

The assessed communities are in the worst situation, where the survival, itself, seems a challenge to those living in tents with no supplies to manage their basic needs. Due to recent rainfall/flood people have lost their houses and livestock. The affected people require temporary shelter or tarpaulin sheets.

## 12.3-Sanitation, Health & Hygiene:

Due to stagnant water, there is a significant risk of Mosquitos and other vectors growth. This may spread vector borne diseases on large scale such as malaria, diarrhea, hepatitis. The poor hygienic conditions may also result in spread and outbreak of other highly contagious diseases such as measles and pneumonia, these may affect the vulnerable population such as children, pregnant women and person of old age and with disabilities.

In the view of survey REEDS team observed that the IDPs are living in poor hygiene condition without any latrine and cleaning facilities. Health conditions are believed to worsen in coming days causing water borne diseases, malaria, Gastro, and fever. REEDS staff estimated that almost *22200 latrines in Dadu and 9000 in Jamshoro damaged* while the exact data will be collected after the water dries. As REEDS team is working from last four years in District Dadu and Jamshoro directly with 19500 farmers. REEDS with the coordination of District Health Department initiated mobile medical camps but they are not sufficient. It is feared that if proper medical facilities are not arranged at district level, commonly experienced diseases will cause large scale deaths of IDPs, especially women, children, and elderly persons. Many IDPs have started to complaint skin and fever problems at different camps and settlements.

## 12.4-Details of the Crop Damage

Agriculture is main source of rural communities' hundreds of villages and crop fields have been affected or badly damaged by floods, the major crops affected are Cotton, Rice, fodder, Maze, Lentils etc.

#### 12.5-Details of Livestock died/drowned

The livestock species play very important economic, social and cultural functions for rural households in flood affected areas they contribute to improve income and wellbeing of the farm family. Livestock helps them for food supply, family nutrition, family income, asset savings, soil productivity, livelihoods, transport, agricultural traction, agricultural diversification and sustainable agricultural production, family and community employment, ritual purposes and social status. In the recent floods livestock is the major component which affected the most.

Further, mostly women are engaged in livestock management but the department does not have availability of the female staff to technically facilitate the poor women and pre as well as during the flood, the vaccination did not benefit properly due to the less interest and commitment of the livestock department. Not-only the livestock thousands of poultry birds and poultry sheds has been destroyed.

## 12.6-Food stored in shape of Wheat and Rice destroyed in Maunds (40 kg/maunds)

IDPs in different camps as well people in the water are facing shortage of food items which is increasing their sufferings. It is estimated though numerous visits to spontaneous settlements and camps and only 8 to 10 percentages to total IDPs are able to feed properly while people in water have lost their food stored in the shape of wheat and rice. Majority of the population at camps on the safety bunds and settlements is women, infant, children, and elderly persons. It is feared that nutrition deficiency in women and children shall cause health problems in next few days. As a whole 29151 Maunds of wheat and 28695 Maunds of rice has been destroyed.

## 12.7-Water sources destroyed (irrigation & drinking water)

In case of irrigation sources almost 100% tube wells and hand pumps are destroyed and need full repair and maintenance to make it functional for the next crop.

The stagnant water level is about 4-6 ft. and it will take about weeks to recede water so dewatering is identified as one of the major needs as families and children are still stuck at their homes, many roads and streets are submerged in water limiting the mobility and access of the people to the markets and other necessities. There is an urgent need for ensuring supplies of safe drinking water through tankers, and water treatment measures (chlorine) or supplies. As health risks are associated with the use of contaminated and untreated water for drinking purpose.

#### 14- Recommendations by the Team during Emergency:

In a rain/flood emergency, all assessed districts reported to some extent similar basic priority needs. Now it's very crucial to provide prompt relief response to the population of affected areas on priority basis and provide support for the restoration of their livelihood as follows:

- 1. Provision of **Food and non-food items** relief for the local affected population of for a period at least thirty days.
- 2. Provision of water purification tablets and safe drinking water.
- 3. Distribution of emergency shelter kit
- 4. Distribution of health and hygiene kits after health & hygiene promotion sessions especially for women and children
- 5. Establishment of Child Friendly Spaces
- 6. Distribution of dignity kits among Adolescent girls
- 7. Installation of the **communal hand pumps** on safer places
- 8. Provision of **dry fodder** for the livestock (wheat straw & Concentrate)
- 9. Provision of **mobile medical facilities** through trained health care providers including curative and preventive activities to support the health needs of the population having difficulty in access to the main district hospital
- 10. Provision of **mobile veterinary services** to support the health needs of the livestock, which are the main assets of the affectees.
- 11. **Coordination and networking** with district administration, National Humanitarian Network, District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) etc.
- 12. Monitoring & Reporting

## 14.1-Recommendations by the Team during Rehabilitation:

- 1. Disinfection of the stagnant pounds after rain stops
- 2. Dewatering from the crops and villages
- 3. Agriculture inputs for the coming crop Wheat for food security
